The Ravenswood Manor Food Drive started in December 2009 as a way for our special community to give back to those less fortunate. Since the our first collection, we have steadily supplied 8-10 bags of groceries to The Albany Park Food Pantry each month.

The Albany Park Food Pantry is located at 5101 N. Kimball, Chicago, IL 60625 and provides emergency food to the needy and poor. Most of the food is obtained from the Greater Chicago Food Depository, but donations are always needed! Items needed are cereal, beans, rice, canned fruits and vegetables, diapers and baby formula.

HPAC is looking for new members and will elect new officers in October. They also need help with garden mainte-



nance, after state and city funding cuts.

In recent months, the HPAC has been working on their Summer concert series and a number of park improvement projects. The latter include a new information kiosk in Manor Park, possible community garden plots and a new flagpole at Horner, and a Horner riverbank initiative with the US Army Corps of Engineers, Chicago Park District, and Congressman Mike Quigley's office to get appropriations needed to remove the fence, improve the deteriorating riverbank, and create a path there.

The Council meets first Mondays each month, 7pm, except in August. The July meeting is likely at Sunken Gardens Park. Due to the Labor Day Holiday, the next meeting will be Monday, September 13th, 7pm at Horner Park Fieldhouse.

Inviting Community is Everybody's Business

A new neighborhood website showed up in December, 2009, but it's not the work of RMIA.

According to the site, ManorNeighbors.com was created by one Jedidiah Tingle. The idea was to create an easy-to-use space where neighbors could share important news and information, directly and immediately and get to know neighbors all over the Manor, as well as we know the people next door or across the street.

So far, 110 neighbors have signed on as members. The Manor Families Food Drive (see page 3), the Men's Book Group (reading made easy, at the Montrose Tap), neighbors reporting on CAPS, HPAC, Garden Club, RMIA and other meetings have used the site. The newest development is a Neighbor-to-Neighbor page where anyone can offer services, like guitar lessons or babysitting.

In this way, inviting community really is everybody's business – because everybody can read it. Anyone who registers as a member (it's free) can post a meeting, project, event or report. That means that everyone is able to take some responsibility, make a large or small offering, and make Ravenswood Manor more "inviting" than ever.

The site creator is an active member, but has no special personal, professional, or financial stake in the site. He runs it as a community service, a neighborhood gift – and a friendly invitation to other neighbors to connect and share – inspired by Ravenswood Manor developer and storied philanthropist, William Harmon, aka Jedidiah Tingle. Historical Marker: Chicago Daily Tribune, Display Advertisement, July 18th, 1909

Henceforth, Chicago will not be developed in a haphazard fashion with little regard to the modern standards of city and suburban planning. People of even moderate means will demand something for their money besides promises. They will want to know about the restrictions – the improvements – the maintenance – the class of people – the artistic surroundings. Henceforth a home will mean more than four walls – a roof – and a mortgage. Ravenswood Manor has set a standard for future development and home ownership. When \$100,000.00 worth of lots were snatched up in one day by home-hungry – rent-weary Chicagoans – we knew, and all thoughtful people knew that the old days were gone...

Prices and Terms: Lots, \$690 to \$990. \$10 secures any lot. \$7 to \$10 Monthly pays for it. No Notes. No Mortgages... 200 Homes for 200 Persons for \$200 down... Free Car Fare for One Year for those who purchase, build and reside in Ravenswood Manor before 1910...

Ravenswood Manor developer Wm. E. Harmon, renown for his marketing and his pioneering use of installment payment plans in real estate development, sold not just here in Chicago, but in 30 other states, as well.
