Waters Elementary Updates

With the start of school, it is no surprise there is much going on at Waters Elementary. Below are a few highlights of previous activities and future events:

SPRING FUNDRAISER

A Successful "Last Hurrah" Waters hosted its first annual silent auction "The Last Hurrah" on June 8, 2007. The event was held at the DANKHaus and participants enjoyed food from local restaurants and sweeping views of the city at the sixth floor skyline deck. The event raised a net total of \$21,000. Some of the highlights of the event included a wine ring toss and a cash raffle of \$1,000. Thank you to all who came to share in the fun and support Waters. All proceeds will help fund programs and needs at Waters School this year, starting with a new Math Program this fall.

Summer Overview

Spanish Immersion Camp: This past summer, Waters Today in conjunction with Waters Elementary offered three sessions of a two-week Spanish Immersion camp for kids ages 4-7. The camp sessions were full within two days of opening registration. Nancy Beza (Waters' new Pre-K for All teacher) and an aide taught eight kids per session, completely in Spanish. After reading all the survey responses post-camp from the parents, the main request was for longer sessions next summer. One camper summed up the experience by saying, "of all the camps I did this summer, I only want to do Spanish Camp again."

Global Explorers Summer Camp: Over the course of two weeks, twenty-two children, ages 3-8, visited the world through crafts, storytelling, movement, music, and more. Passports in hand, children "flew" to a different country each day, collecting flag stamps and "money" from each destination. During the program, children explored ten different countries and cultures through various hands-on activities. Some projects included creating Brazilian Carnivale masks, learning a Maori haka, participating in a Chinese dragon dance, making Moroccan drums, dying Nigerian adire, breaking a Mexican piñata, telling Indian shadow puppet stories, painting Spanish tiles, decorating Haitian spirit bottles, and making Wampanoag pinch pots.

This program, like last year, will also serve as one of Waters' weekly afterschool programs, starting in October.

Abrakadoodle Camp: Two different options were available for an Abrakadoodle camp – a tot class held once a week for four weeks and a one week camp offered to children ages 3-8. Many houses in the area are filled with the beautiful artwork produced during these sessions. It is the hope that this program, like last year, will serve as one of Waters' weekly afterschool programs to start in October.

Ravenswood Manor Recycling Program

2007 marks the 20th year Ravenswood Manor has been in the forefront of recycling in Chicago. Because of our long tradition of environmental responsibility, the RMIA has provided an alternative to the City's Blue Bag program, and its offering a weekly, sourceseparated, alley pickup program that operates at 100% efficiency. This year's subscription program, in partnership with the not-for-profit Resource Center, is an inexpensive way to save landfill space, protect the environment, boost the local economy, and preserve natural resources.

Historical District Update

The RMIA has retained Granacki Historical Consultants to complete our nominating application to get Ravenswood Manor listed as a Historic District on the National Register of Historic Places. RMIA has undertaken a fundraising campaign this past summer in order to support the cost of a paid professional who is best suited to prepare the nominating application. We hope that the nominating application will be submitted by the end of 2007 and that a determination will be made on our application in early 2008.

The RMIA, especially the Historic Committee, would like to thank everyone who has contributed to this cause. Without the support of neighbors, this effort would have never been possible. The Historic Committee is still in need of donations to reach its fundraising goal. My Fond Farewell to Affordable Milk and Deli

With the conversion of the White Hen Pantry into a 7-Eleven, my wife and I find ourselves scrambling for a new source of our lunch time staples, milk and sliced turkey. These perishable items need to be purchased in small quantities, a week's supply worked for us. The White Hen offered fresh sliced deli and sandwiches to help support a healthy lifestyle. The deli prices were about a dollar per pound less than comparable products at major grocery stores. As many of us know, the purchase of one pound of deli meat and/or cheese got you a gallon of milk for a price at least a dollar below market. With the introduction of the 7-Eleven, these deals are gone and we find ourselves searching for new sources for these perishable items.

Recent milk price increases are as high as 30 to 40 percent, but I find milk is regularly on sale at Walgreens and Jewel. Both these vendors have web

sites where the sale items can be viewed. Jewel's house brand "Jewel Milk" is \$3.29 per gallon and often on sale for 30 cents less, much lower than the \$3.69-\$4.29 we found at various stores on Montrose.

The deli is a trickier matter. Priced at record high levels, the lunchtime Turkey and Swiss sandwich is becoming an unaffordable luxury. Two good sources lie just outside our neighborhood. I find that the Aldi at 2431 W. Montrose offers a good selection. Owned by the same people who own Trader Joes, this nofrills store offers very low, everyday prices, often 30

Waters' Pre-K Programs

Waters offers both a tuition-based Pre-K as well as a Preschool for All Program. Both are taught by bilingual teachers and offer some Spanish enrichment. Both Pre-K classes are play based, where the children learn to problem solve and become self-confident through hands-on, meaningful experiences. Child must be age 3 by Sept. 1 and must be potty trained to be eligible for either program.

The tuition-based Pre-K, in its second year with Miss Flores, runs from 8am-6pm. As of early September, there are one or two spots still available. Call the school at 534-5090 if you are interested and ask for Miss Flores.

The new Preschool For All teacher, Nancy Beza, "has transformed the classroom and is loved by all her children. She is warm, energetic and creative," says Tracy Fisher, new Waters parent and CPS Pre-K teacher who won the Kohl-McCormick Early Childhood Teaching Award this year.

to 40 percent lower on fresh produce. Pre-packaged deli meats and cheeses are among the offerings. The other store many people might not consider is the Cermak Produce at 4234 N. Kedzie. I find this store boasts friendly personnel and very low prices on fresh meat and produce. Their deli counter offers an excellent selection. We tried the sliced turkey at \$2.99/ lb which was great.

Macys thought no one would care if the name of the store and the type/quality of the merchandise was different, they were wrong. Ditto for the 7-Eleven. Sure, we'll occasionally cough up big money for the over-priced necessity, but, with careful planning, we will still enjoy an affordable lunch with an ice-cold, high-calcium, fat-free beverage.
