Manor Recycling Program



2001 marks the fourteenth year Ravenswood Manor has been in the forefront of recycling in Chicago. Because of our long tradition of environmental responsibility, the RMIA has deemed it necessary to provide an alternative to the City's Blue Bag program, and is offering a weekly, source-separated, alleypickup program that operates at 100% efficiency. This year's subscription program, in partnership with the not-forprofit Resource Center, is an inexpensive way to save landfill space, protect the environment, boost the local economy, and preserve natural resources.

To sign up for the Ravenswood Manor Recycling Program, at

the cost of \$52 for the year, call the Resource Center at (773) 821-1351 and request an application for service.

As in previous years, collection will be in the following categories:

- 1) co-mingled glass bottles and jars, all cans and aluminum
- 2) Newspapers
- High grade paper such as glossy catalogs & magazines, junk mail and office paper
- 4) Low grade paper such as brown envelopes, phone books and cereal boxes.

Due to space limitations, corrugated cardboard and plastics cannot be collected; residents are encouraged to use the City's pickup or the North Park Village drop-off (5801 N. Pulaski) for these items.

Here are some key differences between the two programs:

RMIA Recycling Program	Blue Bag Program
Everything set out gets recycleda guarantee!	Much recyclable material ends up in landfills.
quality recyclables.	Compacting recyclables with garbage causes breakage and contamination, reducing or nullifying their value.
fee, which amounts to a \$1 a week.	The regular purchase of Blue Bags is required (it is estimated that families who recycle with this program and get at least one daily paper would spend between \$20 and \$30 a year on Blue Bags).

Before 7:30 A.M. Mondays, subscribers set out recyclables in grocery bags or small boxes by the garbage bins; newspapers may be bound.

Traffic Update

he warmer weather is here and traffic proposals for the year are being addressed. The Alderman's office and the RMIA are working together to ease the traffic concerns in our community.

Since our neighborhood traffic vote in May 1999 we are moving forward with Alderman Mell, going street by street with a limited number of solutions available to our neighborhood from the Chicago Department of Transportation.

Addressing the traffic concerns in our neighborhood is an ongoing process that will be phased in over the years. This year Manor Avenue is slated to be resurfaced and will include cobblestone textured crosswalks that are meant to visually accentuate the pedestrian crosswalks to motorists.

One option that has been implemented successfully on Sacramento Ave South

of Irving Park is the installation of a low, broad speed hump in the middle of the block. The hump, which can be driven over comfortably, encourages drivers not to speed in between our stop signs. With the upcoming street resurfacing, speed humps are slated to be installed on Manor Avenue since written approval was given from a majority of Manor Avenue residents. Other streets in our neighborhood will be eligible for speed humps next year as long as a majority of the residents of that street approve the speed humps.

MILLION DOLLAR COOKIES Katheryn Walsh

1/2 c dark brown sugar (packed)

2 c flour 1/4 t baking soda

1/2 c granulated sugar 1 c butter 1 eqq l c fine-ground nuts l t vanilla extract extra 1/2 c gran. sugar

Cream butter and sugars. Add egg and beat well. In another bowl, sift flour and soda together, then add gradually to egg mixture. Blend in vanilla and mix in nuts. Place extra sugar in a bowl. Roll the dough into walnut-sized balls and roll in sugar to coat. Place about 2 inches apart on a cookie sheet and flatten each cookie with the bottom of a glass dipped in the sugar. Bake in a 350° oven for 8 to 10 minutes.

Taste like a million! So buttery and nutty, that you will want to make them often.





CRUST: 1 c flour 1/4 lb butter

2 T granulated sugar

Combine ingredients by hand and press into a 9''x9'' pan. Bake in a 350° oven for 25 minutes, then set aside to cool.

FILLING:

2 eggs l c granulated sugar 1/4 c flour l t baking powder 1/2 c shredded coconut
3/4 c chopped nuts
1 #2 can tart cherries

Drain cherries well. Beat eggs with sugar and gradually add flour and baking powder. Fold in coconut, nuts and cherries. Pour mixture into baked crust, and return to oven. Bake for 30 minutes. Serve warm or cool.

Here is a quick dessert for those days when you are short of time, but want a sweet morsel to top off a meal.

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
