The RMIA's Semi-Annual Meeting will be held at 7 p.m., Monday, April 17th, in the Horner Park Field House, 2741 W. Montrose Ave. At least two current issues are scheduled for discussion at this meeting:

North River Communities Existing Conditions Overview

North River Communities Neighborhood Plan In January, the "North River Communities Existing Conditions Report" was released for public review and comment. On February 22nd, a large public meeting was held at Roosevelt High School to receive community input on the draft document. Additional community presentations are being made throughout the study area, which is bounded by Bryn Mawr Avenue, the North Shore Channel, Montrose Avenue, and Cicero Avenue.

The 112-page report was prepared by the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP), in cooperation with the North River Commission and a steering committee of representatives from a dozen civic associations, including the RMIA, along with area businesses and institutions. Among the issues and opportunities identified in the report are: Housing Affordability and Quality, the Lawrence Avenue corridor, Neighborhood Diversity, River/Parks/Trails, Stormwater and Flooding, and Transit-Oriented Development. CMAP project leader Brian Daly will attend the April 17th meeting, in order to hear from Ravenswood Manor residents and explore their visions for the future of the North River Communities area.

Albany Park Gas Main Replacement Project Beginning in late-March—and extending through August—Peoples Gas will be replacing gas mains and service lines in the Albany Park neighborhood, including Ravenswood Manor.

Several intersections along Sunnyside Avenue will be impacted, at California, Francisco, Manor, Mozart, and Richmond, as well as portions of alleys, and the intersection of Eastwood and Manor.

Time to Plant

There are two community gardens in our neighborhood—one small and one large.

The oldest community garden is located at the north end of LaPointe Park, at Manor and Giddings. It was established in 2000 and its raised bed features nine 4 x 7-foot garden plots. To reserve a plot, please send an email to lapointegarden@ravenswoodmanor.com. A \$25 annual fee is used to defray the costs of tiller rental, composting, etc.


The newer—and larger—community garden is the Global Gardens Urban Refugee Training Farm at 2954 W. Lawrence Ave., on the site of a former candy factory. Established in 2012, this one-acre garden is operated by the Peterson Garden Project to "improve access to fresh vegetables for newly-arrived refugee families and their urban neighbors." Its 4 x 8-foot plots, when available, cost \$85/year. However, a recent check of the web site (www.peterson.garden.org) says: "Garden Full/Waitlist Full."

Welles Park NaturePlace

A fundraising campaign is underway to help create a "natural" play area—for children of all ages—on the site of a former playground in Welles Park, along Montrose Avenue, just east of Western Avenue.

The project is being led by the Greening Committee of the Welles Park Advisory Council (WPAC), in cooperation with the Chicago Park District and the Friends of the Parks. The group has raised more than a third of its goal of \$30,000, which would be used to create the Welles Park NaturePlace. According to the WPAC's web site, the natural play area would "serve as a wild place, full of hidden nooks, climbing challenges, and buzzing wildlife."

The Manor Garage Sale will be held on Sunday, May 21st, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. This annual event attracts thousands of shoppers who walk the streets and alleys of our neighborhood, visiting more than 100 sale locations. 

Mosaic Morphs Into Mural

The Wilson Avenue Bridge beautification project, which was announced in the Winter 2015 issue of *Manor News*, has had a change of plans.

According to the Wilson Bridge Mural Committee, the original idea of four mosaic panels on the bridge's concrete approach walls has been abandoned, due to maintenance and safety concerns from the Chicago Department of Transportation.

As a result, the Committee has decided to execute the four original designs—by East Albany Park artist JoAnne Conroy—as painted murals. Work is expected to begin this summer and will be done by Conroy and Manor resident and muralist Thomas Melvin.

Project funding comes from the aldermen representing the two sides of the Chicago River, Ald. Deb Mell (33rd Ward) and Ald. Ameya Pawar (47th Ward), as well as the RMIA and donations from area residents. The nonprofit North River Commission has agreed to serve as a project partner.

Don't Be a Sap: Plant a Parkway Tree

The RMIA applied in March to participate in a tree-planting program for the neighborhood's public parkways, which is planned for this fall in conjunction with the Openlands' TreeKeepers Program. This volunteer program allows residents to only pay a small percentage of the cost of the tree planting (usually about \$100). However, the resident also must agree to water the tree during its first two seasons.

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I Am Curious (Manor)

Q: A recent article in *Manor News* (Fall 2016) reported that a former professional baseball player, Fred Pfeffer, lived in the neighborhood in the 1930s. In light of the Chicago Cubs' recent World Series championship, are there any famous Cubs players who resided in the Manor?

A: Cubs third baseman Ransom "Randy "Jackson (1926 -) reportedly lived in the house at 2858 W. Wilson Ave. with his wife, Ruth, from 1952 to 1954. Longtime residents say they remember him riding the "L" to Wrigley Field on game days. Jackson's seasons playing for the Cubs were 1950-55 and 1959. He also played for the Brooklyn/Los Angeles Dodgers and the Cleveland Indians.

Jackson recently coauthored "Handsome Ransom Jackson: Accidental Big Leaguer." The title alludes to a nickname he was given by a sportswriter early in his career. The subtitle refers to Jackson's contention that he was a better golfer and football player—two sports that paid much less, at the time, than baseball. Following Jackson's baseball retirement in 1959, he worked in the insurance business in Athens, Georgia, where he still resides.

Last year, Jackson was nominated by the *Chicago Tribune* for the "All-Time Chicago Baseball Team" (finishing behind Ron Santo at third base). A two-time All Star, Jackson hit at least 19 home runs in three consecutive seasons and finished his decade-long career—which was cut short by a serious injury—with a batting average of .261.

Another Cubs All-Star player, catcher Gabby Hartnett, also is rumored to have lived in the neighborhood while running a bowling alley in Skokie, although no Manor address has been confirmed. Hartnett played for the Cubs from 1920 to 1940. He died in Park Ridge in 1972.
