## Lawrence Gateway Project – Meeting Tomorrow Development



Lawrence Gateway Project – Meeting Tomorrow Development

A proposed commercial and residential apartment development at 2919 W. Lawrence Avenue – along the northern edge of Ravenswood Manor – recently engendered a lot of neighborhood feedback as zoning changes were debated.

The "Lawrence Gateway" development would be built on the gravel parking lot and triangular warehouse building where Meeting Tomorrow has operated in recent years. The developer is planning to build a five-story building (two ground-floor commercial units and forty studio, 1br, and 2br units) and an improved and land-scaped parking lot for up to 20 vehicles immediately to the west.

The entire building will be built west of the alley that runs between Lawrence and Giddings, so the main "factory" building between the alley and the river will not be impacted. The existing multi-unit residential building at Lawrence and Manor will also not be impacted.

In community meetings, including a November 21, 2023 meeting hosted by Alderman An-

dre Vasquez to consider the proposed zoning changes needed for the project – the developer emphasized:

- The unique design of the building: Designed to fit the space and location. Including custom siding (copper finish corrugated metal) and floor to ceiling windows, setbacks for upper floors, and a four-story signature mural meant to mark the "entrance" to Albany Park and to tie into the "Confluence" project which is expected to improve Ronan Park.
- Associated community improvements: Including an improved alley (with greater setbacks and new paving) and an improved "angled" path at the corner of Lawrence and Manor (where there is currently a dirt path north of the apartment building).
- Necessity of the Parking Lot: The area proposed for the parking lot cannot be built on because of an MWRD easement (the deep tunnel runs below it). The developer also believes some parking is needed for the commercial spaces.
- Affordable Housing. The development, if a zoning change is approved, would have 8 af-

fordable residential units interspersed with the 32 market-rate units. As mandated by the city's inclusionary housing regulations, this represents 20 percent of the total units.

• **Green Design:** The development exceeds City of Chicago requirements and will be all electric.

Although there was much positive feedback, at meetings and in social media comments, residents, including neighbors on the north side of Giddings who are directly impacted, expressed concerns. Some of the most frequently raised have included:

• Parking. Concerns expressed about too little parking (since the parking lot is for the commercial spaces and not for residents). Neighbors expressed concerns about the impact on street parking on Giddings and other nearby streets.



- Congestion. Concerns about the impact on: (a) the already difficult intersection at Lawrence and Manor and (b) traffic in the alleys adjacent to the development (including to access the parking lot).
- Environmental factors. Concerns about impact from potentially exacerbated drainage problems, noise (from HVAC and other mechanical features), and soil disturbances (from demolition and construction).

After collecting neighborhood feedback, Alderperson Vasquez's office ultimately approved the zoning changes needed to allow the project to continue to proceed. To further address neighborhood concerns, however, his office is commissioning a traffic study for the intersection of Lawrence and Manor and is investigating streetscape / traffic calming measures for the stretch of Lawrence adjacent to the development. If the project goes forward, the developers expect work to begin on the ground in mid-2024.

# Major Improvements Coming to Ronan Park



Over the last several years, the North River Commission (NRC) has been working with the Park District, Our Great Rivers, and many other stakeholders on the exciting "Confluence Project" – and it is now getting very close to becoming reality.

The project aims to improve and activate a series of sites, primarily including the entrance to Ronan Park along Lawrence Avenue. When complete, it should vastly improve the northern "entrance" to Ravenswood Manor and provide a lush and welcoming gateway to Albany Park more broadly. We provided detail on the project in a prior edition of the Manor News, and there is more on the NRC's website:







The project, the result of extensive conversations and meetings with neighbors, groups and stakeholders, has funding (via TIF funding), and the Park District is in the process of pricing out bids. Renderings of what the final result might look like are pictured, though subject to change based on pricing. Work on the community gardens, a part of which will be moved to accommodate the new entry to Ronan Park across from Manor Ave., is already underway.

The proposed "Meeting Tomorrow" development discussed separately is directly across the street from the entrance to Ronan Park, and contemplates a significant amount of additional trees and landscaping on the south side of Lawrence. So between the two projects, the Lawrence Avenue approach to Ravenswood Manor promises to look very different – and hopefully far better – in the very near future.



# Ruth Robbins (1918-2023)

Ruth Robbins, a resident of Ravenswood Manor for nearly 100 years, passed away on September 30th. She was 105.

In 1924, at age 6, Ruth moved with her parents and sister Elaine to a new two-flat in the 4400-block of California Avenue. They shared the building with Ruth's grandmother Eva Dveres, a Russian immigrant, and several other relatives. Ruth continued to live in this house her entire life.

In a 2014 interview, Ruth recalled playing in the muddy streets of Ravenswood Manor, before they were paved. One game, she said, was called "Three Feet Across the Mud Puddles," which involved trying to jump across the pools of water in the street.

Ruth also remembered playing in nearby Buffalo Park. "My friends and I would put our dolls in their buggies and take an umbrella and go to the park because there was water trickling down" from a large fountain in the park. (The concrete fountain, which featured several buffalo heads, was removed in the 1940s, due to severe deterioration.)

One of Ruth's favorite childhood haunts was a drugstore and soda fountain at the corner of Mozart and Montrose. "We'd go there and have our sundaes," she said, while eying the "silver beautifully-wrapped" Nancy Keith chocolate bars that were made right in the neighborhood. "I always had very expensive taste for chocolate," Ruth added. (For more on Nancy Keith Candies, see "Lela Mueller and Bess Recoschewitz: Candy Makers" in the Fall 2017 Manor News.)

A c.1930 advertisement for Robbins and Staufert, a leather goods manufacturer co-owned by Ruth Robbins' father Samuel.

The first movie Ruth said she saw was "Peter Pan," a 1924 silent picture, at the Alba Theatre on Kedzie Avenue, north of Lawrence Avenue. (The theatre was torn down in the 1970s and a senior housing complex now occupies the site.) Ruth also recalled learning to drive on the streets of the newly-platted Budlong Woods subdivision, before any houses were built.

Ruth's father, Samuel, was co-owner of Robbins & Staufert, a leather goods manufacturer. Ruth recalled that "all of my teachers (at Bateman Elementary) were so happy when they'd have me in their class, because they knew at Christmas they would get a handbag."

Ruth graduated from Von Steuben (then-Junior) High School and Roosevelt High School, before attending the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She worked for several publishing companies (e.g., Ladies Home Journal and McCall's magazine), before joining the staff of the National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians (NABET) in 1953. She worked as an administrative assistant to the union's president until 1992, when she retired.

"She was a one-person office for many years," says Susan Gerb, who worked with Ruth for 15 years at NABET. "I always had great respect for her," Gerb adds. "She was a very interesting woman. She had great fashion sense and she liked nice things."

"She was the quintessential liberated woman," notes her niece, Jeffie Margolis. "She lived her life the way she wanted," which included traveling the world, either alone, with friends, or with her sister Elaine, who preceded Ruth in death.

Margolis says that her aunt did not want a funeral service. Instead, Ruth's life will be celebrated by her family next spring "when her tulips are in bloom."

The 2014 interview with Ruth Robbins was part of the Ravenswood Manor Centennial Oral History Project. In addition to Ruth, several other oral history participants have recently passed away, including John Byrne, Beth Newell Murphy, and Eileen Valentin. 

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## Manor Ash Trees Protected Until 2026

Thank you, Ravenswood Manor! Thanks to your generosity, the RMIA raised enough money to once again inoculate and protect 99 of our beautiful Ash Trees!

The inoculation protects Ash trees against the Emerald Ash Borer, a highly invasive beetle from north-east Asia that feeds on ash species and will kill every tree it infests. Ravenswood Manor has approximately 108 Ash trees in the parkways. Of these, 99 were identified as healthy enough to save, and were inoculated in May. This treatment protects the trees for 2-3 years, so the trees should be protected until approximately spring of 2026.



As most of you know, the City of Chicago abandoned its inoculation efforts of the city's Ash Trees as a budgetary decision in 2018. There has been renewed discussion about a city-wide program, so there is hope that the city could start inoculations again before 2026.

NOTE: Take a careful look at the Ash trees next time you take a walk. The Ash trees were tagged when inoculated, so you can easily identify which Ash trees are being treated.
